

The above activities are designed to help you understand the causes and effects of the war between the English and the Wampanoag. Read the text carefully and answer the questions. The text is divided into six paragraphs. Write a short paragraph for each paragraph explaining the cause and effect.

<p>1. King Philip's brother died.</p>	<p>How did King Philip feel about the English? Explain.</p>	<p>King Philip had hoped to work with the English. Now he did not trust them.</p>
<p>2. The English put two Wampanoags to death after finding them guilty of murder.</p>	<p>How did the Wampanoags react? What did this lead to?</p>	<p>Some Wampanoag warriors attacked the English settlement of Swansea and killed nine people. Now King Philip had to decide if he should make war on the English.</p>
<p>3. English forces feared that the Narragansett tribe would join King Philip's war against the English.</p>	<p>What did the English do to prevent this?</p>	<p>The English attacked a large Narragansett settlement and killed hundreds of men, women, and children in the Great Swamp Fight.</p>
<p>4. King Philip asked the Mohawks for help.</p>	<p>What did the Mohawks do? How did this affect King Philip's forces?</p>	<p>The Mohawks attacked King Philip's warriors. This weakened his forces.</p>
<p>5. The English thought they were losing the war.</p>	<p>What did the English do to increase their forces? How did this change the war's outcome?</p>	<p>The English again began to use friendly American Indians in their army. The English began to win the war against King Philip.</p>

About 1 in 20 English settlers and about 4 in 10 American Indians in New England died.</p>	<p>After the war, who had lost power and who had gained power in New England?</p>	<p>After the war, most American Indians were gone from the area. The English settlers would recover, grow strong, and prosper.</p>
